OBJECTIVE / OBJECTIF

This document provides a situational update on airport status and Customs entry points during the COVID-19 pandemic.

COUNTRY BRIEF / COMPTE RENDU

Indonesia was not included in the United Nations' 2020 COVID-19 Global Humanitarian Response Plan (GHRP).

Internal restrictions have been imposed by the government. 'Large scale social restrictions' (PSBB) apply to various areas and other restrictions apply in other areas. Inter-provincial toll roads and public transportation will remain open for essential workers and services. All public facilities are closed including places of worship, schools and entertainment venues, as well as some tourist attractions. All businesses in non-essential sectors have been urged to implement working from home arrangements for staff. PSBB in Jakarta are being eased in a number of stages. Essential services are available, but public activities (including schools, offices, religious activities, social and cultural gatherings and public transportation) continue to be limited to maintain social distancing. Bali will similarly ease PSBB restrictions in phases.

AIRPORT STATUS / STATUT DES AEROPORTS

1. Airport / Flight restrictions (updated 10 July 2020)

Passengers are not able to enter or transit through Indonesia. This does not apply to:

- Nationals of Indonesia;
- Passengers with a Temporary Stay Permit (ITAS) or Permanent Stay Permit (ITAP);
- Passengers with a Diplomatic Visa or a Service Visa;
- Passengers with a Diplomatic Stay Permit or Service Stay Permit;
- This does not apply to passengers with a visa issued after 31 March 2020.

Domestic flights in Indonesia are operating within certain routes and under a limited schedule, subject to certain restrictions (subject to a negative PCR test) (source: WFP, 7 July 2020).

2. Passengers / Quarantine (updated 10 July 2020)

Passengers and airline crews must go through medical screening upon arrival and be quarantined for 14 days. They must have a medical certificate issued within 7 days before arrival stating a negative COVID-19 PCR test result, that the passenger is free from respiratory disease and 'fit to travel', *or* be tested for COVID-19 upon arrival. This does not apply to nationals of Indonesia. Passengers without a medical certificate with a negative COVID-19 PCR test result are subject to medical screening and quarantine for 14 days. Airline crew without a medical certificate with a negative COVID-19 PCR test result are subject to medical screening and quarantine until their next flight.

3. Airlines cargo Operations status (updated 12 June 2020).

Garuda Indonesian Airways updated their domestic cargo schedule for July 2020. Cargo services are available for GEN, PER, AVI, PIL, VAL, HUM and DGR. Garuda also offers Cargo Charter services (domestic & international). Details on flight schedules are available on the airline website. (source: IATA, 1 July 2020).

IMPORTATION AND CUSTOMS / IMPORTATION ET DOUANES

4. Customs, land, sea (updated 19 June 2020)

Sea ports:

All vessels must undergo port health clearance twice. Crew change is permitted for Indonesian crew at some ports but not allowed for foreign crew. Shore leave is not permitted; however, certain ports may have varying restrictions.

Air ports and road transportation:

- All terminals within Indonesia are operating normally for cargo. Freighters are flying as normally but capacity is constrained;
- Road network transportation is normal within cities and between city limits;
- Customs are operating as normally in clearance with no significant delays due to COVID-19 restrictions reported.

5. Customs, importation procedure (updated 30 June 2020)

The Directorate General of Customs and Excise published a list of measures undertaken in response to COVID-19:

- All submissions of import applications that are granted exemptions can be done through the Lembaga National Single Window (LNSW) portal;
- The government has relaxed various import and export restrictions, especially for reputable traders (companies with high-level compliance). Reduction of import restrictions intends to accelerate imports of raw and semi-finished materials for local manufactures:
- Various policies have been instituted for the safety and protection of Customs officers.

Exportation procedures:

A previous Ministry of Trade regulation, No. 23/2020, was effective from 18 March 2020 but is no longer effective as of 30 June 2020. This temporarily banned the export of antiseptic, raw materials for the creation of masks, PPEs, ethyl alcohol and other items. Ministry of Trade regulation No. 31/2020, which amended the previous regulation, also does not apply as of 30 June 2020.

Importation procedures:



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A previous Ministry of Trade regulation, No.28/2020, was effective from 23 March but is no longer effective as of 30 June 2020. This temporarily eliminated import certification requirements on imports of certain products, such as masks and PPEs, due to COVID-19.

Effective 17 April 2020, as of Ministry of Finance regulation No. 34/2020, the temporary elimination of import tariffs on certain medical and pharmaceutical products used in the treatment of COVID-19 was implemented. This included 73 tariff lines at 8-digit level, in the following HS Chapters 29; 30; 34; 38; 39; 40; 62; 63; 64; 65; 90. Imports also exempted from VAT and income taxes.

Effective 9 April 2020, as of Ministry of Finance regulation No. 30/2020, the payment of excise duties on imports of certain goods is temporarily postponed due to COVID-19.
