Subject: WP.29 [1998 Agreement] – For Submission – –November 11, 2014 US EPA summary, GTR notification report

In accordance with Article 7, *Adoption, and notification of application, of established global technical regulations*, of the “Agreement concerning the establishing of global technical regulations for wheeled vehicles, equipment and parts which can be fitted and/or be used on wheeled vehicles” (1998 Agreement), The United States would like to notify the Secretary-General of the status of global technical regulations (GTR) and amendments voted in favor by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. This includes:

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency intends to update the Secretary General on an annual basis as to the status of these GTRs and amendments in the United States.

AGREEMENT CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHING OF GLOBAL TECHNICAL REGULATIONS FOR WHEELED VEHICLES, EQUIPMENT AND PARTS WHICH CAN BE FITTED AND/OR BE USED ON WHEELED VEHICLES

In accordance with Article 7 of the above mentioned Agreement, this is to notify that the United States has taken initial steps towards the adoption of Global Technical Regulation No.11 (GTR No. 11) entitled "Engine Emissions from Agricultural and Forestry Tractors and from Non-Road Mobile Machinery".

The US EPA's air pollutant emissions standards that cover Forestry Tractors and Non-Road Mobile Machinery fall under the *Non-Road Compression-Ignition Engine Emission Regulations* for model years 2007 and beyond. These regulations are in the *Code of Federal Regulations*.

The United States has yet to complete a review of the test data to establish an appropriate correlation between its current emission test procedures and equivalent limits based on the procedures set out in the GTR No. 11. Once this is completed, the US EPA plans to propose amendments to its regulations to implement the provisions of GTR No. 11. The United States will continue to update the Secretary General on an annual basis as to the status of this GTR.
